

# National Puzzle Day Activities!



## Toddlers (1–3)

**Best puzzle types:** chunky knobs, inset puzzles, 2–6 pieces, large floor puzzles

**Setup tip:** Put puzzles on trays so pieces stay contained.

**How to teach:**

- Use 1-step language: “Match.” “Turn.” “Push.”

Model first, then let them try.

**If it’s too hard:**

- Reduce pieces, start with 2–3 pieces, or pre-place 1–2 pieces.

**Teacher phrases:**

- “Try turning it.”



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- “Let’s look at the picture.”
- “You’re trying, that’s great!”

## Preschool (3–5)

**Best puzzle types:** simple jigsaws, 8–24 pieces, shape/letter/number puzzles

### Strategies to teach:

- “Edges first.” “Match colors.” “Find the picture clues.”

### Classroom management:

- Assign roles: Piece Sorter / Builder / Helper

### If it’s too hard:

- Sort pieces first, remove extra pieces, or switch to a 12-piece version.

### Teacher phrases:

- “What do you notice about this piece?”
- “Which piece has the same color/shape?”
- “Let’s try a different spot.”

## School-Age (5–8)

**Best puzzle types:** 24–100+ pieces, logic puzzles, word/sequence puzzles

### Challenge options:

- Team puzzle (group completes one puzzle)
- “Strategy talk” (kids share what worked)



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**If it's too hard:**

- Break into sections: border first, then one color area at a time.

**Teacher phrases:**

- "What's your plan?"
  - "What strategy could you try next?"
  - "How can we work as a team?"
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***Optional Add ons*****Set-up (2 minutes):**

- Choose puzzle difficulty, label bags, set each station with a tray and visual direction card.

**Clean-up routine:**

- "Count pieces" (older kids) or "all pieces in the bag" (younger kids).
- Store each puzzle in a labeled zip bag.

**Learning goals by age (one line):**

- Toddlers: matching + fine motor
- Preschool: persistence + early problem-solving
- School-age: strategy + teamwork + reflection



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
